Teacher/Mentor Notes Greeting An Alien

Summary: These notes have four sections. The first provides some Internet links to background information relating to Aliens. The second provides information on teaching the Robot Ambassador to approach and retreat from the Alien. The third provides suggestions for the construction of the Arena on which the action takes place. The fourth contains some suggestions about possible construction of the Alien.

1. Alien Background

Well, when looking for web resources on this subject, I was just about overwhelmed! It seems a lot of people want to believe in the existence of Aliens. The following notes probably contain much more information than you will need unless you are VERY interested, but you may perhaps find something to stimulate thought.¹

- 1) Want to greet an Alien by sending an Alien greeting card? Maybe $here^2$ or $here^3$.
- 2) Feeling affectionate and want to send a Valientine card? Maybe here!⁴
- 3) There were lots of images suggesting some politicians were aliens, one of the more printable examples was (Ex-)President Bush supposedly greeting an alien (said by one of the people commenting to be Tony Blair!). It can be seen <u>here</u>.⁵
- 4) Want to know what an Alien landscape might look like? Maybe <u>here</u>⁶.
- 5) Want some Alien colouring-in images for your class? Maybe <u>here</u>⁷.
- 6) Want an Alien ring-tone for your mobile? Maybe <u>here</u>⁸.
- 7) Not satisfied with a ring-tone, and want a complete song about *Meeting an Alien*? Maybe here⁹.
- 8) The UN is considering appointing a space ambassador to greet alien visitors, see <u>here</u>¹⁰.

- 9) There is also an "Official Abductee's Handbook" about which one reviewer comments "Actually I should be happy that something this bad could be published; it gives me hope that mine will find a publisher", you can purchase this for \$U\$0.03 here¹¹.
- 10) In an April 19, 2002 entry, a blogger comments <u>here</u>, "For a standardized test, we were presented the question: 'If you were on the first mission to greet an alien race, What three things would you bring from earth to make peace with them?' My answer, and new philosophy: 'Simply, the three things that fix anything: love, time & duct tape.' ".

On a (slightly) more serious note, it is claimed <u>here (paragraph 2)</u>¹² that "Today – 'UFO' [Unidentified Flying Object] ranks as the second most Googled word and scores the second highest hit just after 'porn' – three in every five people believe our planet has been visited by an alien civilization – there's even an US government funded program (SETI) to look for little green men." The SETI (Search for Extra-Terrestrial Intelligence) project is sponsored by many reputable organizations (see <u>here</u>¹³), their website is <u>here</u>¹⁴, and a Wikipedia article on SETI can be read <u>here</u>¹⁵.

The possibility of life outside Earth has also produced religious thought. There is a course offered about (amongst other topics) "how Jews might ... greet an alien being visiting Earth" <u>here</u>¹⁶.

The University of Wyoming is offering a creative writing course about "What to say to E.T. [Extra-Terrestrial]" <u>here</u>¹⁷, a comment about the course can be read <u>here</u>¹⁸.

People's need to believe in aliens may perhaps be seen in the famous reaction to Orson Welles radio dramatization of H.G. Wells' "War of the Worlds" fantasy, which reportedly caused panic and jammed roads as people fled from New York, see an article about this phenomena <u>here</u>¹⁹.

2. Teaching your Greeting-an-Alien Robot

NXT-G: The main approach, and the approach suggested by Lego as being the easiest to learn, is to teach your Robot how to behave using the NXT-G language supplied with your NXT set.

Instructions will vary, according to how far your Robot starts from the Alien. The instructions for teaching the Robot to approach and retreat from the Alien, using the arena <u>here</u>, are:-



3. Construction of alternate "Greeting An Alien" Arenas

3.1 Tapes on the classroom floor: In the simplest case, all that is needed is a couple of taped lines on the floor – ordinary masking tape would be fine. One tape line could be for the starting line for the Robot Ambassador. The second line would be the one the Robot Ambassador has to cross before the Alien can "hear" the Robot Ambassador. A taped cross on the floor could mark the place for the Alien to stand.

3.2 Using an A1 printer: An alternate arena that can be printed using an A1 printer is:



3.3 A straw-board arena: Another alternate arena that I have used consists of a straw board [1] with a sheet of cardboard [2] fixed to it to represent the "red carpet" for the Alien to stand upon. The red

cardboard was fixed to the strawboard with double-sided Scotch or similar transparent plastic tape, but I imagine using any standard liquid glue would probably be fine.


The advantage of these latter two arenas for me is that I am ready to start when first entering the classroom, and cleaning-up at the end of the session is minimised (remember I'm a guest in the classrooms in which I mentor).



The distance from the right-hand edge of the Arena to the start of the red area is about 80 cms. (2 feet 7 ½ inches). Your NXT-G instructions will have to allow for more rotations of the Robot wheels than are shown in the web example, as this arena is bigger than the 3.2 arena.

4. Construction of the "Alien"

You can probably make a far more convincing "alien" than I could quickly manage – it might even be a useful classroom art project! I used two plastic cups [3] with print-out stuck to them with double-sided transparent tape. The images I used were:-

You could also use the previously-mentioned "colouring-in" alien images prepared by your students for this purpose, again perhaps a useful class activity, depending on your Grade.

Obtainable Where?

The following information is included to provide an idea about price & availability - it is not intended to be a recommendation for any particular commercial institution. The prices were current at the end of 2008. In 2012 the cost of printing the A1 paper sheet arena was \$2:05 if it was classified as a plan, \$4:95 if it was classified as a poster (it varied with the assistant!)

[1] The strawboard is a sheet of thickish cardboard, 1050 mm by 800 mm (3 feet 5 inches by 2 feet 7 inches). Straw boards were obtained from an Art supplies Store; (in my case "Artery", Collins Street, Hobart, Tasmania \$4.95).

[2] The red cardboard sheet can be obtained from an Office Supplies shop or an Art Goods supplier; (in my case Officeworks had a limited selection of colours and sizes at \$1:38 each, Artery had a much more extensive selection of colours and sizes, at prices ranging from \$2.10 to \$2.56). In this case I used a sheet of cardboard cut approximately in half, so one sheet could suffice for two Arenas.

[3] The plastic cups were obtained from a "remainder store" (in my case "Chickenfeed" – 10 cups for \$2).
